Pearl-Cohn Firebirds End the Season with a Kick

Season Record 10-2 (21-9)

On March 16, 2023, at the Murphy Center in Murfreesboro, Tennessee, the Pearl-Cohn Firebirds went up against the Alcoa Tornadoes for the TSSAA state tournament quarterfinals.

Given the first two quarters of the game, the Firebirds started off at a slower pace than normal, "We came out slower than usual, and it came back and bit us," Keith Roland explained. Alcoa led 27-20 into halftime, but the Firebirds weren't backing down there. Battling into the third quarter, Pearl-Cohn picked up momentum and landed 41-39 starting off the fourth & final quarter. With time cracking down on both teams, Pearl's Doyel Cockrill III hit a 35 foot 3-pointer at the last buzzer, but Alcoa was already three points ahead.

Although the Firebirds didn't take home the win, the boys played their best. Going for the first state tournament win since 1998. Most doubted that the Firebirds would even make it this far, but considering they did, everyone is still as proud. Coach Smith commented, "They have nothing to hang their heads about. Losing does not mean you had a bad season; they have to understand that."

"I'm always proud of my guys, we wanted to go farther, we wanted to get to the state championship and win. That was my goal from the jump... We just came up short today, but I'm still proud of everyone," senior Doyel Cockrill III said.

Cancer has quite a few treatments to choose from, the most popular are chemotherapy and radiation.
Covington stated, "I was going to chemo once a week and did that for four weeks." The treatments can be very hard on a person, it can go from being physical issues to mental issues. "Some days were rough but some days I was okay, I really didn't do much anyway." It's best to keep yourself busy during appointments and visits because it can be time-consuming. "I did

a lot of word puzzles, when I did chemo, I always did a lot of word puzzles because I'd be there for about three

hours." Though it's very rough, a good support system can help

you be strong about your situation. Ms. Covington said, "My family and friends were my support system, my sister would stay with me." The healing process can be very painful and long. "It was a long process because I did the surgery in March and started radiation in May, it was rough, and my breast are still sore."

Breast cancer is a hard process but with the right medical help and a good support system can be a good start for the battle. In Nashville there are support groups to join that can be very helpful.

Donald Trump is the 45^{th} president of the United States. In 2020, he was banned from both social platforms. On Jan. 7, 2021, Former president Donald Trump was banned from both Facebook and Instagram for a total

of two years. This was a result of the Jan. 6, 2021, insurrection of the capital. Is it Really Protection?

Tennessee is in the motion of passing House Bill 1, banning minors in Tennessee from accessing gender dysphoria and treatments such as puberty blockers and hormone therapies. This bill is prohibiting medical professionals from providing transgender minors with treatments, "for the purpose of enabling a minor to identify with, or live as, a purported identity inconsistent with the minor's sex," according to the bill's text.

Republicans have continuously lauded each bill as "protective" for children, but this bill only makes things worse in a way. It's a debate that's been all over social media. Some think this decision should be left in the hands of families, and others say this is about protecting children. After asking staff and students what's their opinion on this bill being passed, some disagree that minors should have the access to these things. "Bill Lee is very ignorant & hypocritical; he has an old picture

surfacing of him being a drag, but he's signed a bill restricting public drag performances and is now trying to control other people' lives. It's messed up, they're not understanding how deep & personal the situation really is," Mrs. Lavigne explained. Others agree that children are too young to make such a permanent decision, Mr. Brown commented, "They should have the access to the information and some support, but you're making a permanent decision at a young age that'll change the rest of your life."

The bill is now advancing to another house committee before it can go to the full house. A representative from the ACLU spoke at the hearing stating the organization is prepared to sue the state if this becomes a law. Governor Bill Lee said he will look at the details and is supportive of the concept. If he signs the bill, it will take effect in July.


A Tennessee Firing Squad

Rep. Dennis Powers who's a lawmaker in Tennessee, introduced a bill stating that inmates who are going to be executed on death row are going to have the choice between lethal injection and firing squad. Powers, along with his supporters of this bill stated during a committee meeting that it would be the most humane form of execution, but some people beg to differ. Rep. Paul Sherrell agreed but took the conversation a step further by suggesting that hanging should be another possible option of execution. Rep. Sherrell also said that he fully supports this bill, and stated, "It's a very good idea and I was just wondering, could I put an amendment on that, that would include hanging by a tree also." According to Sherrell his "exaggerated" comments were intended to convey his belief that for the cruelest and most heinous crimes, a just society requires the death penalty in kind. He also stated that his, "Intention was to express support of families who often wait decades for justice. I sincerely apologize to anyone who may have been hurt or offended." But ultimately Representative Powers said that it would be up to the Department of Corrections.

Currently in Tennessee, people that are put on death row are executed by lethal injection. Tennessee has executed 13 people whereas other states such as Texas and Oklahoma have executed roughly 100 to 500 inmates. Compared to the United States where there have been exactly 1,566 men and woman executed to date.

PC students had an opposite opinion than the representatives with Todd Campbell stating, "I believe that when it comes to giving the people the opportunity to die via a firing squad or lethal injection. I think that it's fair but when it comes to "lynching" or hanging by a tree it shouldn't even come back because it's disrespectful because of how it started and what it started for, and I personally don't feel like it's anything that they should bring back." Robert Knight said something similar when asked about how he feels about the execution's options stating, "We don't need the firing squad or the lynching and it's horrible that they would even try or suggest to bring back lynching is horrible and sick and it should never be brought back."

Pearl-Cohn's very own cosmetology teacher and licensed hairstylist Ms. Clay not only educates students on the importance of hair care but also in skin and nails. 


